Why is Wofford not making greater use of a computer in aid to education? Perhaps the need does not exist or is not recognized. Perhaps the present time-sharing service cannot meet the need. Another reason may be that it unquestionably requires considerable time and effort to prepare a new course approach. It takes additional effort to learn how a computer might help and still more to learn programming and to prepare the necessary programs. While many of our students may not need to write programs, they probably can benefit from experience with the behavior and analysis of systems more complex than our classroom presentations usually treat. A computer simulation of such a system, once completed, would serve many students in subsequent years. In other words, there may be a need which cannot be met due to the press of other duties.

Our computer terminal can become more than an improved desk calculator if the Computer Center can offer more service than just a teletype and a place to sit. A staff of students, employed by the Computer Center, would provide a needed extension of service. These students, trained in computer use, would serve as Computer Assistants to their own departments. Several students are sufficiently interested and capable (could be more so with encouragement from faculty friends) to write the necessary programs. A start in preparing this group has been made in past Computer Concepts Interim projects in which many students have developed programs chosen to be useful in current courses of interest to them. If such a staff existed, its function would be to work with interested faculty members on possible computer applications and to prepare such applications as needed. This might require considerable knowledge of the subject matter concerned, some knowledge of terminal operation, of programming and perhaps specific numerical methods. The staff would also, of course, be available for routine terminal operations required, for example, for data analysis or report generation. A student-staffed Computer Center could provide a real service to several parts of this college, including the Administration.

Could such service benefit your teaching????
